Attention WWII Veterans

A medal and a clasp have been approved and will start being presented as early as March 2013.

BOMBER COMMAND CLASP AND

ARCTIC STAR

A Clasp to the 1939-45 Star is granted to the aircrew of Bomber Command who served for at least sixty days, or completed a tour of operations, on a Bomber Command operational unit and flew at least one operational sortie on a Bomber Command operational unit from the 3rd September, 1939, to the 8th May, 1945, inclusive. The award of the Clasp is to be denoted by a silver rose Emblem when the ribbon alone is worn.

Eligibility is extended to those members of Bomber Command aircrew who did not meet the qualifying criteria due to service being brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service, service marked by a gallantry award or taken as a prisoner of war.

Foreign nationals commissioned or enlisted into British or, the then, Dominion Air Forces (e.g. **Royal Canadian Air Force** or Royal Australian Air Force) are eligible provided the individuals did not receive a similar award from their own Government.

Eligibility to the Bomber Command Clasp has no effect upon eligibility for World War Two recognition previously awarded and does not suggest automatic eligibility for any further awards.



Bomber Command Clasp

The Arctic Star is granted for operational service of any length north of the Arctic Circle (66 degrees, 32'N) from the 3rd September, 1939, to the 8th May, 1945, inclusive. The Arctic Star is intended to commemorate the Arctic Convoys and is designed primarily for the ships of the convoys to North Russia and their Escorts. Eligibility is defined as follows:

- Navy and Merchant Navy Naval and Merchant Navy service anywhere at sea north of the Arctic Circle to include, but not limited exclusively to, those ships participating in, and in support of, Convoys to North Russia. Fleet Air Arm Personnel, not qualified by sea service may qualify under the conditions applying to the Royal Air Force.
- Air Force Aircrew of the Royal Air Force will be eligible if they landed north of the Arctic Circle or served in the air over this area. Non aircrew on operational service in the area, for example ground crew or those sailing with CAM ships (Catapult Aircraft Merchant Ships), are also eligible.
- Army Army personnel serving in His Majesty's ships or in defensively equipped Merchant ships qualify under the rules applying to the Navy or Merchant Navy. In addition, personnel taking part in land operations north of the Arctic Circle will also be eligible.
- Civilians serving with the Forces Members of the few approved categories of civilians who qualify for Campaign Stars will be eligible if, in support of military operations, they meet any of the above qualifying criteria.
- Foreign nationals commissioned or enlisted into British or, the then, Dominion Forces (e.g. Royal Canadian Navy, Royal Australian Navy) are eligible provided the individuals did not receive a similar award from their own Government.
- General Eligibility to the Arctic Star has no effect upon eligibility for World War Two recognition previously awarded and does not suggest automatic eligibility for any further awards.

A War Memorial for West Carleton

Good day, John.

I was talking to my next door neighbour Bob
Thomson earlier this week about my involvement
in the West Carleton Cenotaph, which is being built
on the small piece of ground at the bottom of
Falldown Lane and Donald B Munro in the village of
Carp. I have joined the committee as
archivist/secretary and am currently writing up
the history of the past two years as to how this
project came about, as well as offering my time for
the writing of funding request letters, minutes and
action plans, and status reports.

Our mission is to complete a permanent memorial to the brave men and women who voluntarily served their country, and who made the ultimate sacrifice, as no such memorial exists in the Carp/West Carleton area. My colleague, Stuart Hodge, who is our project lead and Chair of the Committee, and I would very much like to come and talk to the RCL Kanata branch and give a short presentation and video and hopefully solicit interest by your members in this important project. Stuart is an RCL member at Constance Bay and local Carp business owner and Dunrobin



resident. I am a Kanata resident and semi-retired aerospace/defence business consultant.

The Carp BIA is planning to construct a Cenotaph to honour those men and women of the West Carleton area, who died in both World Wars and in the Korean War and who enlisted and stood up for Canada. The City of Ottawa, through our local Ward 5 Councillor Eli El-Chantiry, is assisting with by-law requirements. The Carp BIA will enter into an agreement to assume responsibility for the installation and maintenance of the Cenotaph.

Design work and detailed site planning have been completed. Work is now proceeding to complete the site approvals and to begin site preparations. Many local individuals, companies and volunteers are already involved with the very generous provision of in-kind donations of services and materials to offset costs. Veteran Affairs Canada has agreed to a major funding contribution of \$50,000 under their Cenotaph/Monument program. Those costs which must be funded include the sculpture itself, the landscaping and site preparation, and other professional services which are essential to convert the site from its present use as to a permanent monument. We are working to raise a total of \$200,000 by November, 2013.

If you and your members would be interested in hearing more about this project, please contact me and I will liaise with Stuart as to a suitable day and time. Monopoly – more than just another board game

Thanks to Branch President John Cher for this fascinating bit of military history)

From around 1941, an increasing number of British Airmen found themselves as the involuntary quests of the Third Reich, and the Crown was casting about for ways and means to facilitate their escape...Now obviously, one of the most helpful aids to that end is a useful and accurate map, one showing not only locations, but also the locations of 'safe houses' where a POW on-the-lam could go for food and shelter. Paper maps had some real drawbacks – they make a lot of noise when you open and fold them, they wear out rapidly, and if they get wet, they turn into mush. Someone in MI-5 (similar to America's OSS) got the idea of printing escape maps on silk. It's durable, can be scrunched-up into tiny wads, and unfolded as many times as needed, and makes no noise whatsoever.

At that time, there was only one manufacturer in Great Britain that had perfected the technology of printing on silk, and that was John Waddington, Ltd. When approached by the government, the firm was only too happy to do its bit for the war effort.

By pure coincidence, Waddington was also the U.K. Licensee for the popular American board game, Monopoly. As it happened, 'games and pastimes' was a category of item qualified for insertion into 'CARE packages', dispatched by the International Red Cross to prisoners of war.

Under the strictest of secrecy, in a securely guarded and inaccessible old workshop on the grounds of Waddington's, a group of sworn-to-secrecy employees began mass-producing escape maps, keyed to each region of Germany or Italy where Allied POW camps were regional system).

When processed, these maps could be folded into such tiny dots that they would actually fit inside a Monopoly playing piece.

As long as they were at it, the clever workmen at Waddington's also managed to add:

- 1. A playing token, containing a small magnetic compass
- 2. A two-part metal file that could easily be screwed together
- 3. Useful amounts of genuine highdenomination German, Italian, and French currency, hidden within the piles of Monopoly money!

British and American air crews were advised, before taking off on their first mission, how to identify a 'rigged' Monopoly set – by means of a tiny red dot, one cleverly rigged to look like an ordinary printing glitch, located in the corner of the Free Parking square.

Of the estimated 35,000 Allied POWS who successfully escaped, an estimated one-third were aided in their flight by the rigged Monopoly sets. Everyone who did so was sworn to secrecy indefinitely, since the British Government might want to use this highly successful ruse in still another, future war.

The story wasn't declassified until 2007, when the surviving craftsmen from Waddington's, as well as the firm itself, were finally honoured in a public ceremony.

It's always nice when you can play that 'Get Out of Jail' Free' card!
