The Last Post

Comrade Bill Wilson died peacefully on June 6, 2016, at the age of 68. He was predeceased by his parents: Reginald Wilson and Joan Pryke, and by his brother, Charles Ian Wilson. He is survived by his sister, Sheila Ann Wilson (Robert MacDonald); by his nephews, Eric Albert and Nicholas Roy (Elizabeth Baxter) and by his grandniece, Helen-Rose MacDonald. A legion tribute for Comrade Bill was held prior to the funeral service on June 20 in the funeral chapel at Capital Memorial Gardens on Prince of Wales Drive.

Comrade Bill was a dedicated Legion member almost since its inception; he was active in the Colour Party and was our Branch Cadet Liaison Officer for many years. He was passionate about his hobby of plastic models and was a long-time member of the International Plastic Model Society (IPMS). Bill's other abiding interest was the Progressive Conservative Party of which he attended many conventions. He was also a member of the Canadian Aviation Historical Society (CAHS) and again attended many of their conventions. Tributes to Bill at his service attested to his giving and helpful nature, particularly to the Navy League of Canada, and other organizations.

An insight into Bill's special character came from eulogies given by Bill's nephews, Ken and Nicholas

MacDonald as well as officials from the Navy League of Canada. Ken's eulogy follows in part:

"My uncle Bill was a special kind of individual. He always had a positive approach to life, always wanted to be there for others. And always had smudged glasses and Kleenex coming out of his sleeves and pockets. Born in Ottawa, his father was from Pembroke, and his mother, a war-bride from London, England. This British connection would prove to be an integral part of Bill's identity as he fully embraced the British traditions of volunteerism and participation. After graduating from Woodroffe High School, Bill dedicated his life to helping others, and in doing so became a prolific supporter of many organizations. His love of the British navy is evidenced by his time serving with the Legion, the Navy League, the Cadet movement. and specifically with his establishment of the Falklands/Stadaconna Navy League Association. These institutions were touched by his warm spirit and kind heart.

Making a career at the department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade, Bill worked tirelessly to represent the people of Canada, going so far as to spend three years in Tel Aviv in the foreign service. Upon his return to Canada, Bill made his home in Kanata, and began his work with various associations in the region, including president of his community condo board. He loved to build models and spent many hours recreating some of the greatest ships in naval history. As his epitaph will say: "His joy was in serving others."

The Emotional Side of Moving: Talking about Moving with Seniors

It's really hard to know how to talk to seniors about moving. How and when do you bring it up? What is the best retirement residence? What steps do you take to keep the discussion going?

Home is where the heart is. We've all used this saying at one time or another.

Today, moving is the norm - Canadians tend to move multiple times. From parents' homes to school, in with roommates, out with roommates. We move in and out with significant others, for work, for family, in retirement to a smaller home and then maybe to a retirement residence.

It's exhausting just thinking about it! We, as a society, have become so accustomed to moving that it's commonplace. We're used to this fast paced, tech savvy world and when it comes to moving a loved one, we expect that they'll be able to get on the same page with us, as quickly as we can.

The aging population and the <u>sandwich generation</u>, will not be disappearing in the near future and seniors' loved ones need to take a hard look at some of the obstacles that may be in the way when faced with an impending move.

A Lifetime of Memories

Having worked with over 2000 seniors and spoken to thousands more, I've learned that they on average have spent 50 years in their homes. Consider the memories made, the familiarity and comfort they must have in their homes. To get a better feel for this, estimate how many times you've moved in the last 25 years. I've calculated that in the last 10 years I've moved 15 times. It's second nature to me, and probably to you as well.

After 50+ years, people become deeply rooted in their neighbourhoods. They know where every-thing is, how long it takes to get there and they usually have one or two neighbours who "keep an eye out for me." A few common concerns from the seniors with whom I work are "Everything I need is here." "I won't know anyone." "If I move I will be the talk of the town and I don't want people to know." These are just a few of the hurdles that need to be jumped and we haven't even left the front door.
