

Kiwis in Auckland commemorated the 100th Anniversary of the Gallipoli campaign in 1915. All told, 80,000 lives were lost, including 8,700 Australians and 2,799 New Zealanders. It is said that this campaign became a defining event in the formation of New Zealand's national identity.



The poppies were very large and were pinned to the styrofoam numbers with huge pins. The event raised funds for the Returned Servicemen's Association. Beside the wharf is the *Queen Elizabeth*, built by the Cunard shipping line, which supplied the troop ships during the war. This year, Queen Elizabeth will visit New Zealand as part of the commemoration celebrations. It was interesting to be there for this Poppy Day.

Cadet Support

The Royal Canadian Air Cadets' 706 Snowy Owls Squadron wishes to thank Branch 638 for our support. Cadets were invited to submit an essay on the topic, "Skills that I have learned in Cadets that will help me in life." The Squadron's Sponsoring Committee's 2nd Vice Chair, John Montgomery, provided our Cadet Liaison Office, Bill Wilson, a copy of the winning essay by Warrant Officer 2nd Class Andriy Predmyrskyy. He is apparently finishing his first year of Engineering at the University of Ottawa with the goal of pursuing a career in Aeronautical Engineering.

To whom it may concern:

I would like you to imagine a boy. He is in the seventh grade. He has long hair and an awkward flick cowlick near his forehead. As he walks, he stares at the ground, shoulders hunched over, hands in his pockets. He is quiet and shy, reads almost incessantly, keeps to himself even in a crowd, and does his homework every night. Anyone would say that he is an average boy. The only thing that is different between him and anyone else is that this boy likes planes. He doesn't study makes and models or recite military history, but he loves the idea of powered flight.

I was that boy. And one decision changed my life. It wasn't even my idea. It was my parents who told me of an organization that asked for nothing more than time, and promised everything from leadership to independence, to a pilot's license. Who could say "no" to such an offer?

Only five years have passed since then. In the time it takes for you to say "when did they manage to grow up?" I was able to learn skills that I would never have acquired otherwise. Starting from my first year I became aware of the follower-leader dynamic. I learned it was not only fine, but better to ask for help when you needed it, and every cadet I met was more than willing to. Even something as underrated as basic training taught me how to better deal with others, in addition to forcing me to learn how to take care of my clothing, my bed, and myself.

I remember spending my first few nights at 706 in the corner, reading as I always did. But by the time I finished my first year I learned how to more effectively deal with people, something I could never do as a socially awkward child, and how to make friends from peers I had never met. However, at the end of my first year, I was still quiet and shy.

It was my second year that changed who I was. Another year had gone by at my squadron, and I had been sent to Basic Fitness and Sports in Greenwood, Nova-Scotia. I remember looking at the other kids and thinking "I wish I could be as open as them" and it soon occurred to me: at Greenwood, nobody knew who I was. Most kids were outside of my region, and I'd be very lucky if I saw any of them again. It was then that I decided to cast off any and all shyness I had. I chose to open up.

It was something new for me. I would say "hello" to

random strangers, I would speak my mind and let myself free. It took more than a little effort, but I saw my shell erode. I found that people liked me more, I was having more fun, and was being noticed. I spoke up and let my ideas be known. I made it obvious what I was good at, tried my hardest and pushed myself. Quiet boy no longer. I remember getting this crazy idea in my head that I wanted to have a parade position, so I auditioned, and was a flight commander for my graduation. It was a summer that I will never forget.

And yet, these experiences just kept coming. I remember taking the Basic Leadership course the next year and becoming familiar with all aspects of taking charge, of becoming a good follower. I remember having to deal with people I absolutely hated, but we got along anyways. All these experiences, all this knowledge, at the end of each summer, on Thursday every week, coming back to my squadron.

The next year I took the Survival Instructor course, learned the ins and outs of making it in the wild. I will always remember the sense of camaraderie I felt at the end of those six weeks. Over 40 different kids from 20 different squadrons, and all of them, one family. I will remember the struggles of learning my way with a compass, blazing my own

trail in the woods, making fires from nothing, and not only surviving but thriving off of roots and twigs and mother nature's singular embrace. I will never forget the beauty of seeing the stars in their full glory, miles from any light, seeing the night sky

as it was meant to be seen.

And was it so recently as last year that I went through the trials and tribulations of becoming a pilot? Finally achieving a lifelong aspiration, going from the ground up to the clouds, seeing for miles and flying so gracefully that doves were envious? Nothing that summer was easy. Studying for hours, meeting every deadline and minimum, living with new people, growing so close to some only to watch them leave. It was a hard summer, but not

one I would ever want to live without.

Yet throughout all of this, I was growing at home as well. I saw what I was learning at cadets apply to my school marks, to my home life. Cadets forced me to become organized, to deal with my problems before they became problems, to grow from my mistakes. It taught me how to lead, how to follow, how to listen, and how to learn. It gave me an opportunity to grow, trusting me with responsibility, showing me that I can do better, that I can push, that I can excel. I have become more even tempered and more active in my life.

I began studying harder, and I watched my marks increase. I began making my bed, taking care of my problems, starting all my projects early, completing them before they were due. I have become a more apt leader, being careful of how I mix my honey and vinegar, watching my temper, and knowing when my emotions are getting the better of me. I have learned to work in teams, despite my personal opinions, learned how to synergize and how to compromise, how to unite teams, and how to become an invaluable part of one.

Along the road I have become more open, more friendly, more amiable and proud. I have become

aspirational, inspirational and reliable. I have learned the art of leading and following, polishing and buffing (in more than one sense). I have picked up how to make it in almost any survival situation, learned first aid, become a true team player, and even gotten better at telling jokes. I have discovered the importance of putting my studies first, learned how to cope with seemingly impossible obstacles, and how to deal with crushing disappointment. I have become independent, self-aware, and more socially acute than I ever thought I could be. And how many people can say that they've been granted all these benefits, and come out with a pilot's license? I would like you to imagine the same boy, now a

young man. His hair is short, and his voice is lower, but he has the same eyes. Eyes filled with wonder, with excitement, brimming with a knowledge of all there is yet to learn. He walks now with a full stride, sure of each step. His head is held high, his back straight, his motion confident, and he walks assured that he will be able to achieve more, learn more, become more. He has learned so much, but "much" is not enough. He will train to the highest standard, and that is more than a skill: It is a promise.


