Our Veterans A Profile of Comrade Tom Dick

To create interest in the legion and its members, we plan to provide profiles of our veterans. Our first is that of our genial Seniors Officer, Tom Dick, and we thank Tom for sharing his story with us. Profile provided by Garry Fancy.

y father was a streetcar driver in Glasgow, and saw service during the First World War in the Middle East. I had a sister who died when she was a year old, and a brother who was born in 1916. I was born in 1920. My Mother died at age 29 when I was nearly 4 years old, and when I was 4, my Father emigrated to Canada. My brother and I were raised by our Grandmother and an Aunt. As a youngster, I enjoyed playing "Cowboys and Indians" and other gentle pastimes like "Kick the Can", White horses", etc.

War was declared on September 3, 1939, and before the end of the year I volunteered for military service in the Royal Engineers. Early in the New Year I was in France with the British Expeditionary Force and involved in construction of defences along the Belgian/French frontier, as an extension of the French Maginot Line. Belgium was a neutral country, but was in danger of being invaded by the Germans, and on May 10, 1940, Germany did attack Belgium and our Company moved in immediately to the Country and began taking defensive action, which involved planting land mines on certain canal bridges, and demolishing other bridges by explosives - hazardous work under fire! Within 19 days the situation became chaotic and the B.E.F. was the subject of an evacuation order, which subsequently resulted in over 345,000 troops being taken from the beaches of Dunkirk and De Panne to the United Kingdom - this, over a period of only 9 days!! Naval vessels, merchant ships, pleasure steamers, and dozens of small pleasure boats (later referred to as The Little Ships of Dunkirk) as well as the lifeboats from the larger vessels, all were pressed into service to complete the operation. This was carried out under continuous shelling, bombing, torpedoes and straffing attacks. I was taken off on a destroyer, (H.M.S. Wakeful, lost on its return to Dunkirk) with 600 others. The ship had to be loaded at the bow by rope ladder due to the low tide and the intensity of marine activity in the immediate area.

We disembarked at Dover Harbour after some 7 hours of evasive action in the English Channel, boarded trains and were taken across England to a camp in the County of Dorset for recuperation. We were eventually granted 72 hours' home leave, not including travel time. The next three and a half years were spent training and preparing for re-entry into Europe.

On June 6, 1944 ("D" Day) as part of a four-man British Army Reconnaissance Party, we landed on Juno Beach with the Canadians, on board an American Landing Craft. We immediately came under enemy fire from multi-barrelled mortars, fondly referred to as "Moaning Minnies". There were casualties, but our party of four got off the beach unharmed. Our objective was to reach a particular map reference, clear the area of mines, booby traps and snipers, prior to the arrival of the main body of our Engineer Company, which was due to arrive on D+5. We did have an encounter with a sniper, whose interest was on a group of Canadian Infantrymen. On the first night we bedded down in slit trenches which we dug, and protected them with sections of corrugated steel culvert. During the night, we were subjected to straffing by enemy fighter aircraft.

In the morning, preparing to quit the slit trench, and wearing my steel helmet, I encountered an obstruction hanging from the corrugated culvert, which turned out to be an unexploded aircraft cannon shell. Carefully removing it from the immediate area, it was thrown into a vacant field where it self destructed. Moving further inland and doing our bit for the war effort, we set up a wet and dry assault bridging depot. In one corner of the property was a temporary burial site for several Canadian soldiers who had made the supreme sacrifice. July 14 was the anniversary of Bastille Day in France, and a procession from the local village arrived at the entrance to the depot. It was led by the village Mayor who was granted permission to have a small service at the Canadians' graves. The group was made up of children, women and older males. The children carried posies of flowers and one person carried a French Tricolour (Flag). After service was performed, the Tricolour was placed in the centre of the burial plots, and the children placed their flowers on the individual graves. An emotional tribute to soldiers from anther country who had died helping to liberate them.

Our activities continued in various locations in France, Holland and Germany, until victory in Europe was declared on May 8, 1945. We were sent home on leave prior to being shipped out to the Far East for the war against Japan. These plans were cancelled before the end of the leave when we were recalled to Europe. We took up occupation positions in Germany until May 1946, at which time I received my release from active service.

The foregoing capsulated six and a half years of war service, after which I emigrated to Canada in 1947.
