Dear Friends and Members of the Choral Society,

Not long ago, we wrote to you to invite you to join us for Lest We Forget, on Friday, November 7th, at St. Joseph's Church, when we will mark the 100th Anniversary of the outbreak of World War I. We are especially honoured that General John de Chastelain, who played such a central role in bringing Peace to Ireland, will be participating in this evening's observance.

As part of our program of profoundly moving music that pays homage to the service of so many brave men and women, we are preparing a commemorative booklet, The Passing Bell, which will offer OCS members and patrons a unique way to personally remember and honour loved ones who served in Canada's Armed Forces.

Because our veterans so often return home with life challenges, the OCS will be presenting a donation to an organization that provides services to them. Should you wish to consider a tax deductible donation to the Ottawa Choral Society, your gift will be shared with this organization to support their work. A portion of your contribution will also assist the Society in the presentation of this evening's music of Remembrance.

This is an example of how your entry might be expressed (we suggest up to 50 words):

In Memory of Corporal John Smith Royal Canadian Air Force 1912 - October 1942, age 30 Fighter Pilot. Wounded in action over France

Please note that we have made some important changes to the project since we first wrote:

- The date for the submission of your memorial entry has been extended to Sunday, October 26th.
- A range of contribution levels has replaced a set amount of \$75

Please include a photo if you have one. Scanned images are preferred; however, original photos sent to us will be treated with care and will be returned. If you do not have a photo, your entry will appear beside a framed poppy. Entries may include all who served, or are serving today, fallen or returned. Please visit

Calling All WW2 Veterans

To mark the 75th anniversary of Canada's engagement in the Second World War, <u>the Government of Canada announced a national tribute to honour living Veterans of the Second World War.</u>

Canadians who served at least one day with Canadian Armed Forces, or with any other Allied force including the Canadian or British Merchant Navy, either at home or abroad, during the Second World War, are eligible to receive a special commemorative lapel pin and certificate.

From 1939 to 1945, more than one million Canadians and Newfoundlanders served, with more than 55,000 wounded and over 45,000 giving their lives.

It is estimated that there are approximately 80,000 Canadian Second World War Veterans alive today.

Through this tribute, we are remembering and honouring those who courageously defended our shared values of peace and freedom in the Second World War.



Kitchen Korner

With all the media attention that the Ebola virus is getting lately, it is a reminder that flu season is about to descend on us.

For our food handlers and servers:

- ✓ Getting a flu shot is not a bad idea.
- ✓ Washing your hands as often as necessary is the best protection.
- ✓ Gloves are good, but need to be changed frequently. The rule of thumb is that if you would need to wash your hands - change your gloves!

When should you wash your hands?

- ✓ Whenever you have touched anything that may be contaminated (money, door handles, etc.), or may cause contamination (blowing your nose, touching raw meat, the possibilities are numerous).
- ✓ Common sense is your best guide.

For our servers, gloves are a bit impractical because they would need to be changed every time you pick up dirty dishes

What to do?

- 1. pick up plates by the edges
- pick up glassware by the outer bottom never the inside
- wash your hands or use sanitizer after scraping plates and handling used cutlery

Dishwashers are also at risk, possibly more so than servers. Rubber gloves are provided. **NB:** Putting a good shot of bleach into the soapy water that dishes soak in <u>does not work!</u> The soap negates the bleach, and the sanitizing effect is lost.

Not only is this for the protection of our clients, it is for your own safety, too!

We tend to do things the way "it's always been done." The best I can think of at the moment, is to utilize the bus pans and carts. Servers can clear dishes to them, then the dishwasher can scrape the plates. (Not that there is a lot of room in the kitchen to do this!)

If anybody can think of a more practical plan - let's hear it!

In the meantime, keep washing your hands! ©


