THE VETERANS: DISCOVERING OUR MILITARY PAST THROUGH THE EYES OF THOSE WHO WERE THERE

The Veterans is a 62 episode documentary series which illustrates the impact of Canada's participation in foreign conflicts and crises on Canada, Canadians and the military from WWI up to and including Afghanistan. The documentary focuses on civics, citizenship, nation building and leadership and examines the influence of the changing nature of warfare on doctrine, operations, education, training and equipment. The Veterans also touches on the role of Canadians at large, the industrial and scientific community, aid organizations and NGOs.

The documentary is an oral history. It is a look at Canada's veterans and the serving men and women of the Canadian Forces, their experiences during time of service and what impact it had on them. All branches of service are included.

By examining this series episode by episode you will discover how Canada's military evolved into the modern, well trained and highly capable military it is today. You'll hear from those who were directly involved in that transition process.

The men and women interviewed in the documentary series served selflessly to help make this a better place for everyone. They served to protect our freedom, champion human rights, promote Canada's values and preserve democracy. Let us never forget what they have done and how much we owe them.

"There are old pilots, and there are...": Flying Officer Roy Brook

The old saying, there are old pilots and bold pilots, but no old, bold pilots, proved so true in the case of Flying Officer Roy Brook

I was a young Engineering Officer, enjoying my first RCAF posting at 6 Repair Depot, Trenton, in the years 1962 to 1966. 129 Test and Ferry Flight was a lodger unit of 6 RD, tasked with ferrying aircraft all over the country. One of the pilots at 129 was Roy Brook. Roy was a young gentlemanly ex-Brit/RAF pilot who had returned to Canada after flying Sabres with 1 Air Division. Roy was a devoted young father of a baby son, and husband, who enjoyed a short Friday beer call, and always phoned his wife Marielle, from the Mess to tell her when he was leaving.

Roy and I lived in the same apartment building, and so were on good terms. Roy knew that I loved flying (I did not yet have a pilot's license) and so every once in a while, he would say "Garry, I am taking an aircraft to Dunneville to-morrow. Want to come along?. "Sure, just have to get my boss's permission". I well remember one such trip in an Expediter, flying across Lake Ontario, with the water mere feet from the propeller tips, and then flying up the Niagara Gorge and looking UP at the land. I thought Roy was a great pilot, and flying was surely very exciting.

Some months later, my wife phoned me at work and said "The CO and Padre just came to the building and seem to be at the Brook's apartment."

Roy had just killed himself at Dunneville doing rolls between the hangars in a simple "docile" Chipmunk. Later, at beer call I mentioned to the PAdO (F/L Jim Elmsley) that Roy was a good friend. "Ah ha" said he, "I am looking for an escort for the body to Winnipeg, and you, young man, are it." The trip in

an RCAF Dakota to Winnipeg was one of the coldest and most unpleasant aircraft trips I ever had!

As an afterthought, I wonder what ever became of Roy's son who by now would be about fifty. It would be fitting to say hello to him.

The Ways and Means Committee will be organizing a fundraiser involving the collection of electronic items for disposal (please refer to lists below of items) some time in the Spring of 2013 and asks that you hold on to that computer, cell phone, etc. you are going to throw out for our Spring 2013 Fundraiser and make mention to everyone you know to consider disposing electronic items with the Kanata legion.

FACTS:

The City of Ottawa no longer allows collection or recycling of Phase 1 electronic waste (e-waste) for disposal by companies who are not authorized agents of the Ontario Electronics Stewardship Program. This includes:

PHASE 1

- Televisions
- Desktop computers and terminals
- Monitors
- Laptop computers
- Desktop printers
- Fax machines
- Disk drives
- CD-ROM drives
- Keyboards and mice

"NEW" PHASE 2

The following items and the above must now be collected and recycled by authorised agents of the Ontario Electronics Stewardship Program.

- Amplifiers, stereos, speakers, receivers
- Cameras, digital cameras
- Copiers, fax machines, scanners
- Pagers, PDAs
- Radios, TVs all used hospital equipment
- Telephones, cell phones, answering machines
- VCR and DVD players

Target Recycling would like to discuss ways in which we can divert these items from your waste stream, safely and complete with an Ontario government approved certificate of destruction. Remember, even a reformatted hard drive can contain vast quantities of confidential information that may end up in the wrong hands. Target Recycling will physically destroy your hard drives assuring you your valuable information goes no further. We invite all customers to visit our site for a tour of the facilities and see for yourself how secure and safe our operation is.

Of all the war poets of the 20th Century, perhaps the best-loved and most-remembered, especially by Great War vetreans, is Wilfrid Owen, who wrote not of the glory of war but of its harsh reality.

At this special time of Remembrance, it is fitting that we read once again, a few of his poems. It helps us Remember them —men like my uncles, who fought at Ypres, Vimy and the others.. Here is a sample.

Harry Needham

Apologia Pro Poemate Meo

I, too, saw God through mud— The mud that cracked on cheeks when wretches smiled. War brought more glory to their eyes than blood, And gave their laughs more glee than shakes a child.

Merry it was to laugh there— Where death becomes absurd and life absurder. For power was on us as we slashed bones bare Not to feel sickness or remorse of murder.

I, too, have dropped off fear— Behind the barrage, dead as my platoon, And sailed my spirit surging, light and clear, Past the entanglement where hopes lie strewn;

And witnessed exhultation– Faces that used to curse me, scowl for scowl, Shine and lift up with passion of oblation, Seraphic for an hour, though they were foul.

I have made fellowships— Untold of happy lovers in old song. For love is not the binding of fair lips With the soft silk of eyes that look and long.

By joy, whose ribbon slips,— But wound with war's hard wire whose stakes are strong;

Bound with the bandage of the arm that drips; Knit in the welding of the rifle-thong.

I have perceived much beauty In the hoarse oaths that kept our courage straight; Heard music in the silentness of duty; Found peace where shell-storms spouted reddest spate.

Nevertheless, except you share With them in hell the sorrowful dark of hell, Whose world is but a trembling of a flare And heaven but a highway for a shell,

You shall not hear their mirth: You shall not come to think them well content By any jest of mine. These men are worth Your tears: You are not worth their merriment.
